

## Beatrice Schnoor

*From the Middle Park Times April 28, 1927*

The community is shocked by the death of Mrs. O. Dolloff: The whole community was filled with sadness and sympathy on Monday when it was learned that Mrs. Oliver Dolloff had died. On Sunday, she was well and happy, entertaining friends. At ten o'clock that night she became violently sick with acute indigestion and was not relieved until the end came at one o'clock p.m. on Monday. Wednesday morning friends gathered at the home and escorted the casket to the church at Hot Sulphur Springs which was filled with those who wished to pay their tribute of love and sympathy. Beautiful flowers covered the casket. Very appropriate music was rendered by Mrs. Sullivan, Mrs. Leighou, and Messrs Huntington and Sullivan, with Mrs. Glass as organist. The services at the church and at the cemetery were in charge of Rev. Thos. W. Houston. From the church the party went in automobiles to the Coffee Divide beyond Granby, where they were met by wagons in which the cortege was conveyed to the Grand Lake Cemetery.



At Stillwater and at Grand Lake they were joined by others and there was a large gathering at the grave.

Beatrice Etta Schnoor, the eldest daughter of Mr. Henry Schnoor, was born at Grand Lake on May 12, 1904. Soon after the birth of her younger sister, Mamie, their mother died, but they were lovingly cared for by the Misses Harbison and later by Mrs. Carrie D. Schnoor. Beatrice attended school at Grand Lake and Greeley and became a teacher, teaching two very successful years in the Troublesome Valley and for one year at Hot Sulphur Springs. Everywhere she was beloved for her many virtues and sunny temperament.

On October 10<sup>th</sup>, 1926 she and Oliver Dolloff were married and for six happy months they had lived together at his ranch home on the Colorado River. The memory of her life lingers as a benediction.
