Smith Eslick Cottage Camp

Take a look at the Smith Eslick Cottage Court, so close to being completely restored to its early condition, funded in part by a grant from History Colorado - State Historical Fund. The floors have been authentically replaced or restored, walls look like they once did, the exterior is almost completely restored with repaired or authentically replaced barkie siding, and all the window frames and doors are in process of being sanded, repaired with epoxy if needed and replaced where they belong. Some things have been slightly altered, like the single hanging bulb lights added ca.1935, now stabilized so the Court meets code. This work is being done by Maple Street Builders,.

The Smith Eslick Cottage Court building site was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in August, 2016. The Smith Eslick Cottage Court joins only two other nationally designated local buildings, the Kauffman House and the Grand Lake Lodge! The Cottage Court is a humble, but very special site.

What's next? This summer, the Cottage Camp Planning Committee, working with Traub Design Associates, will complete plans for exhibits, and continue work to secure



funding for weather-resistant and informative exhibits and displays. So many stories to tell. The Cottage Court itself is a marvel, as it's thought to be the oldest original condition rustic motor court, and has stories of its unique architecture, the work of the GLAHS to preserve, restore and protect it, the advent of automobile tourism and how it affected the economies of our area and the entire West, the many ways automobiles changed how we live, and the people whose ingenuity and hard work made it all happen. An interpretive panel about the Cairns #3 Ditch which fronts the Cottage Court property is already being built, and is expected to be installed in late August. This was funded by the Grand Foundation and the Town of Grand Lake, and we are very grateful for their support. Plans for a display of the last remnant of the Cairns #3 Ditch itself are in process of being revised, hopefully to be less complicated. Stay tuned!

We owe so much to an extremely generous anonymous donor who provided and maintains irrigation and the lovely lawn and trees surrounding the Court. Work will soon begin to finalize plans and to fund the completion of other aspects at the site... community event areas, installation of electricity and other utilities, a welcome center and more.


Much of what is planned for the Cottage Camp site, including the Smith Eslick Cottage Court museum and the adjacent property, will entail hands-on local help. The Rotary Club of Grand Lake has donated \$500 as a challenge to others to join their funding to rehabilitate a local \$3,100 Model A to be displayed in a Cottage Court carport. It will have a "seized engine", so it can't be driven, but will be complete in all other ways so visitors can sit in it, look under the hood, imagine taking a trip to the West back in the day. Other elements of the plan will call for donations of lumber and other materials, and some skilled craftsmen or others willing to learn on the job! Contact us if you'd be able to help. We need you!

Displays and Exhibits

Kathy Means and her hard working volunteers develop displays and exhibits at the Kauffman House Museum. Last year's "Dolls for Guys and Gals" featured hundreds of antique, vintage and more modern dolls, action figures, a lovely dollhouse, paper dolls and many more fun toys for kids of all ages. It all came together with the help of many local doll and toy collectors who helped make the entire exhibit fascinating and beautiful.

During the winter holidays, the House was festively decorated for several Open-Museum days, featuring treats and tours, in November and December. Featured around the House were a number of "Wizard of Oz" items from local collector Katie McManus. Additional Open-Museum days were held in January, February and March.

This season's new exhibit is really a series of smaller displays arranged to enhance "A Walk Back in Time". Included are displays of early camping, hunting and fishing, textiles, The Corner Cupboard complex, juniper berry



tools "before electricity". We'd welcome other suggestions... let us know what you'd like to see.

The Gallery of the Museum features short "movies" chosen by visitors, and shown on a large flat screen at the back of the space. These include the slide show originally made for the Kauffman House and narrated by Patience Kemp, a lovely history of Grand Lake titled *Saga of Spirit Lake*, a brief history of the Grand Lake Yacht Club, and a short 1947 film of men working to make the Adams Tunnel as part of the Colorado-Big Thompson Project.



Gardens



Lynne Ludwig, sometimes assisted by Tom Ludwig, has taken on the job of pampering the gardens around the Kauffman House. She weeds and manicures at least weekly, and has added lupine and other native plants; he is the resident weed whacker. It's a big job, caring for the flower beds in front of the Kauffman House veranda, the Pioneer Garden along Lake Avenue east and below the House, and the strip of plants along Lake Street directly across from the marina. It looks wonderful, so we owe Lynne and Tom huge thanks. Caring for the

Pioneer Garden has become much more difficult with the addition of the Steve Cormey Memorial since visitors often climb into the garden to read it and stress the plants or strew trash. Outreach and Education

The Historical Society sent a Spring Newsletter, with a lead article written by Board member Steve Batty, to Grand Lake post office boxes, the postal route along highway 34, and about 100 other

Special tours at the Kauffman House this past year included a group of Mitchell family members; the Mitchell family is the subject of "Survivors", excerpts of which can be read or downloaded on our website, www.grandlakehistory.org. Dave Lively hosted a group from History Colorado, and the newly trained volunteers of Rocky Mountain National

Park toured recently.

Informative presentations with GLAHS volunteer staff members were given to the Rotary Club of Grand Lake, Grand Lake Women's Club, and several other groups. Please contact us if your organization or group of friends would like us to speak; this gives us an opportunity to discuss our favorite topic, Grand Lake history, and to explain what the GLAHS is all about.

Geoff Elliott organized an impressive band for the annual Town Tree Lighting event on the evening of November 25th, and we enjoyed amazing music in the Community House as we dressed a huge crowd of folks in costumes so they could be photographed with Father Christmas, Tracy Temple. We participated in the Grand Beginning's annual Children's Fair, which was great fun; kids making play dough biscuits and baking them in a cardboard wood stove, trying out a rotary dial phone, and more as they



lived a bit of history old and more recent. We try to open the Kauffman House whenever there are Town sponsored events, and offered free admission to the museum from 3:00 - 4:00 on June 9th, as we Celebrated our Colorful Creatives. We will donate a wooden "quilt block" for the Grand Quilts Trail a project of the Heritage Coalition and the Grand Quilters, partnering with the Grand County Historical Association in which quilt patterns will be displayed at county businesses, and visitors will be encouraged to go around to find them. Similarly, both the Kauffman House and Cottage Camp are geo-cache sites for visitors to find.

The Grand Lake Area Historical Society is often asked for advice, photographs, historical information about historic properties, artifacts, people, and we help as we can. We also offer support for other historical concerns or projects, often in a letter or by donations of books or other Gift Shop merchandise for their benefit events.

Malene Mortenson serves as Chair of this committee, which purchases books and other merchandise for the small Gift Shop at the Kauffman House. Malene also has devised a four-fold brochure, a mini "Walking Tour of Historic Grand Lake", which offers visitors information primarily about Grand Avenue historic properties. These "Tours" cost 50¢ each, and are available at many locations around town. Sharon King handles distribution of the "Tours" when Malene is away.

A larger, more inclusive *Walking Tour of Historic Grand Lake* can be purchased from the museum gift shop for \$5.00. Recent additions to the merchandise in the Gift Shop include the Gary Coover book *Memories of the Grand Lake Lodge 1924 - 1926*. Historic photographs, many taken from glass negatives, and various maps are also available.

Collections and Accessions

Kathy Means serves as the Collections Manager; she has able assistance from Rudy Perez who donates a morning each week to accession items into the computer data base. There are still many items in our collection which need further research. If you are interested and want to help with learning more about the historic items in the Kauffman House or in our collections, please contact us.

During the last year, we have received and accessioned many more wonderful items into the collection. We are reminded that history is being made every day. Items that we remember being used in our own homes or those of our parents will amaze and educate the younger folks of today.

Many items were donated by Martha Boehner, including family photos and memorabilia, various books and paintings, news articles and maps, a collection of desk blotters, a darning egg, a photo album and more. Cecelia and Jack Bender also donated many items including a mirror, floor console radio, rotary dial telephone, christening dress, Holstein cow bell, a 1920s-30s table, handmade pillows and a three-drawer walnut sewing table.



A 1930s table scarf and four napkins were donated by Mary Harward, and a spiral bound book "Elected and Appointed Officials of Grand County, Colorado 1874-1990" was given by former county commissioner Duane Dailey.

Cathy Jeffery donated three postcards showing the El Navajo lodge's exterior and dining room scenes, all of which were shared with tonight's presenter. Also immediately useful was the small pot belly stove donated by Al and Virginia Downing, and once owned by Terry and Katie Gailey, and soon to be displayed at the Smith Eslick Cottage Court.

Nancy Nickel contributed a lovely 1958 wedding dress, a 1930s children's tea set, and assorted children's and household items from the 1940s and beyond. A small Grace Putnam doll in a cradle was donated by Daviana Rowe, and has been permanently placed in the Kauffman House following its being in the "Dolls" exhibit. Two other vintage dolls which belonged to her family were donated by Karen Sommerfield. Bob Scott donated a lovely vintage Westmoreland Glass child's punch bowl set and linen tablecloth to the collections, and lent several items now displayed in the Kauffman

Jim Stromberg donated vintage piano sheet music written by John Thompson whose *Modern Course for the Piano* was long the preferred way to learn, and who summered in Grand Lake. Gary Coover, author of *Memories of the Grand Lake Lodge 1924-1926*, donated a copy. This book is also now for sale at the Kauffman House. Books were also donated by Judy Forman, along with a vintage black and white enamel coffee percolator.

We received a 1925 postcard of the Yacht Club from Pam Tyrrell, and a 1960s color photo of Shadow Mountain Marina from Ray Christensen. Scott and Tonya Munn are sharing their Yacht Club collection which we will copy, digitize and return. The Grand Lake Chamber of Commerce has donated a large number of photographs, some in albums, and newspaper articles which we will archive.

The Historical Society accepts donations which have historical significance to the Grand Lake area. We are able to help you preserve your family history by digitizing photos and records if you are willing to share them with the historical society and you can keep the originals.

Special Events

20 Members Were Present: Jim Cervenka, Frank Reardon, Kathy Means, Deb Bondi, Rudy Perez, Elin and Jim Capps, Steve Batty, Patti Stahl, Kenn and Muriel Johnson, Gary Calder, Carolyn Alcorn, Paul Gilbert, Lynne and Tom Ludwig, Nancy and Bob Lavington, Joe and Julie Cunningham. An additional 27 non-members were present for the presentation.

President Jim Cervenka welcomed the attendees. He continued by telling a bit of "what we've been up to and how YOU can help preserve, protect and promote the history of the Grand Lake, Colorado area". The Kauffman House Museum, in operation since 1973, receives up to 5,000 visitors from all over the country and the world each year; Jim encouraged attendees to volunteer three hours a week as docents. He added that, by volunteering even three hours a year, for example selling refreshments at the annual chicken dinner, one can support GLAHS. He noted that lists of items we need, ranging from paper products to full exhibits, were on a nearby table, and encouraged folks to consider donating an item as another way of supporting the GLAHS.

The Kauffman House exterior was fully restored last summer, and windows and trim will be repaired this summer; all of this takes money. The Smith Eslick Cottage Court has been placed on its first-ever permanent foundation, has had flooring restored in two units, and will be restored in the coming months; the foundation and restoration are funded in part by grants from History Colorado - State Historical Fund. Jim explained that both grants require matching funds, and asked attendees to consider contributing. Finally, Jim asked attendees to consider volunteering to serve on the GLAHS board which meets at 7:00 pm every second Wednesday of the month, for about two hours, at the modular office south of the post office.

President Cervenka introduced presenter Hoppe Southway and his wife Cindy. Hoppe presented "The Adventures of Frank and Mona Southway" with pictures and stories about his folks who traveled the world with heavy construction machinery and pipeline work, and owned the Stagecoach Inn before opening the Southway Lodge. Hoppe entertained and educated us with tales of his mom's and dad's work at the Southway Lodge, which hosted the first Grand Lake Buffalo Barbecue, and struggled to make a living while having a lot of fun. Hoppe also explained a bit about his dad's pipeline work, particularly in Israel and Capetown, S. Africa, and shared his own experiences growing up in Grand Lake in the 1960s and '70s.

After intermission, President Jim Cervenka opened the Annual Meeting. Steve Batty moved, Deb Bondi seconded, all agreed to approve the minutes of the 2015 Annual Meeting. Nominations to the Board of Directors: Sharon King must leave the board, but will remain as Membership Chair. Gary Calder has agreed to join the board, Kathy Means and Deb Bondi have agreed to remain for another three year term on the board. There were no nominations from the floor. Elin moved, Frank seconded, all agreed to the election of Gary, Kathy and Deb to the Board. Jim explained that the president is not a member of the board, but is elected annually. Jim Cervenka has been nominated; there were no additional nominations from the floor. Kathy Means moved, Gary Calder seconded, all agreed to the election of Jim Cervenka as President.

Jim reported that we need to get a grant application to the Town of Grand Lake, approximately \$3,000 to \$5,000 or so. Deb suggested we asked for a grant match for the restoration of the Cottage Court. With no additional business, Patti moved to adjourn, Deb seconded, all agreed.

Meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm.
