## 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Grand Lake Community House

### Return to July 4, 1921



**Middle Park Times Reporter (Kathy Means):** A year ago in August 1920 the Middle Park Times reported that PH Smith and Mrs. Carrie Schnoor, from the Grand Lake Village Improvement Association, met with the County Commissioners to secure a building permit and funds to build a Community House in Grand Lake. Officers are: Leslie Ish President, James Cairns VP, Carrie Schnoor Secretary and PH Smith Treasurer.



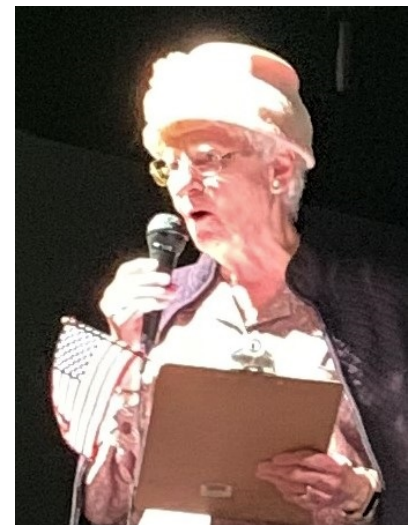
**PH Smith (Bob Means):** We are here to request permission and funds to build a Community House in the public park at Grand Lake. A noted architect from Denver, Aaron Gove, drew our plans and gave them to us, which was no small donation in itself. We also have a well-respected builder who has lumber, a sawmill and a team of carpenters to begin the work this fall.

I will let Mrs. Schnoor fill you in on the ways we plan to use this building.

**Mrs. Schnoor (Julie Cunningham):** Our village is high in the mountains and because the snows of the long winters keep us shut away from the rest of the world, we have felt the urge for a community gathering place. For several years we talked of it and made plans for it but it was not until the Great War was over, leaving us with time and thought for new projects that a definite, workable scheme was brought about.

Ranchers need a central gathering place as much if not more than the people centered in the village itself. As a school teacher, we would like to have a place where the students can present programs and the parents can attend. Our school building does not have room for these activities.

The question of raising funds is always of fundamental importance. We thought it most feasible to procure the money for building by public subscriptions. The amounts were to be pledged either in money, labor or material.



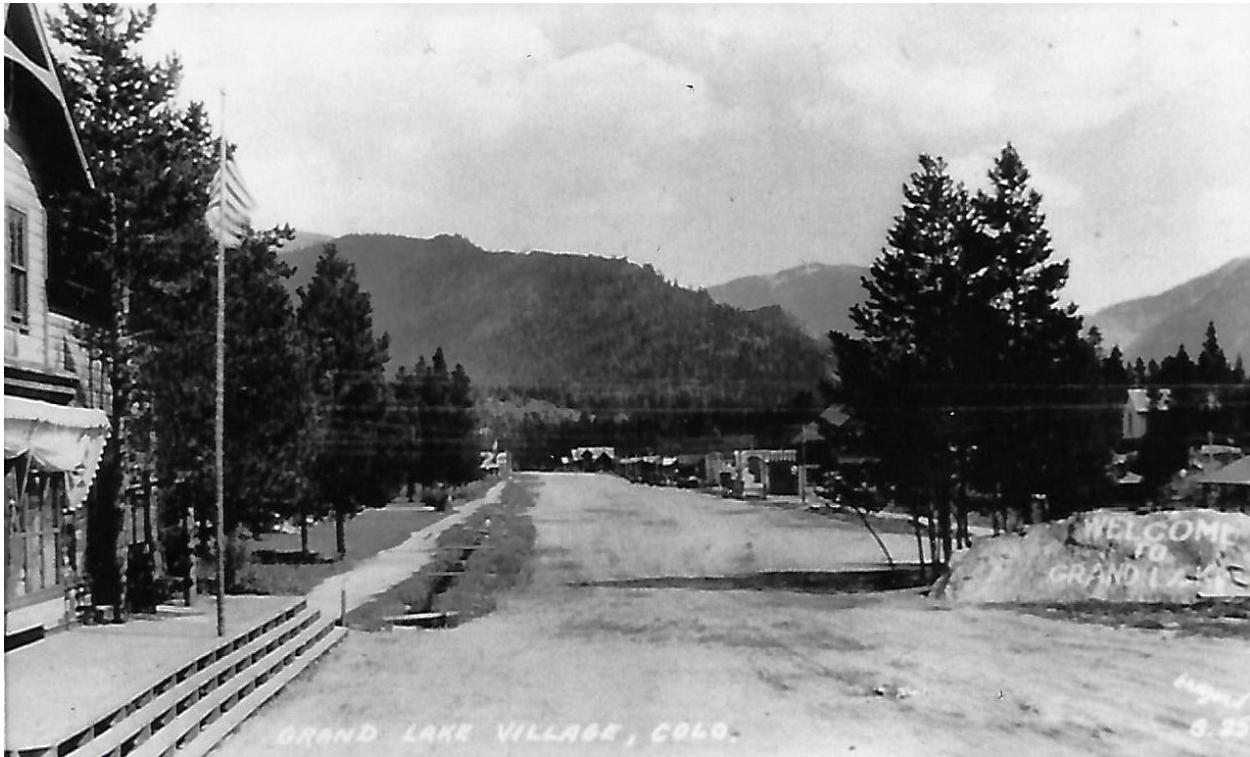


**Commissioner (Jim Cervenka):** Thank you for coming to our meeting. The permission for a Neighborhood or Community House in Grand Lake is granted and the Board will give \$250 toward the building and promise to give a like amount, when the funds become available. We believe the building will add greatly to the attractiveness of the Lake and be a credit to the entire county. The board is strong for every movement of this kind that will make Grand County more inviting to the large numbers of summer visitors that come here.

**Kathy:**

Grand Lake in 1921: Grand Lake, less than one mile square, has 75 residents but a summer population of 2,000. There are many ranches in the surrounding area at an elevation of about 8700 feet above sea level in the mountains and valley of the Grand River.

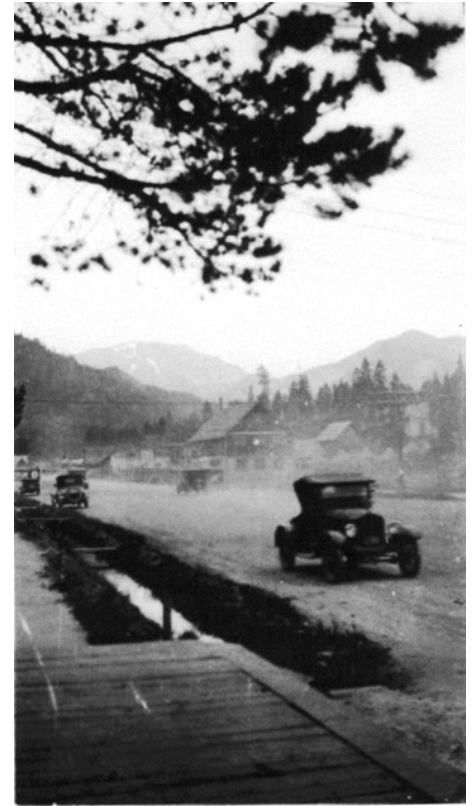

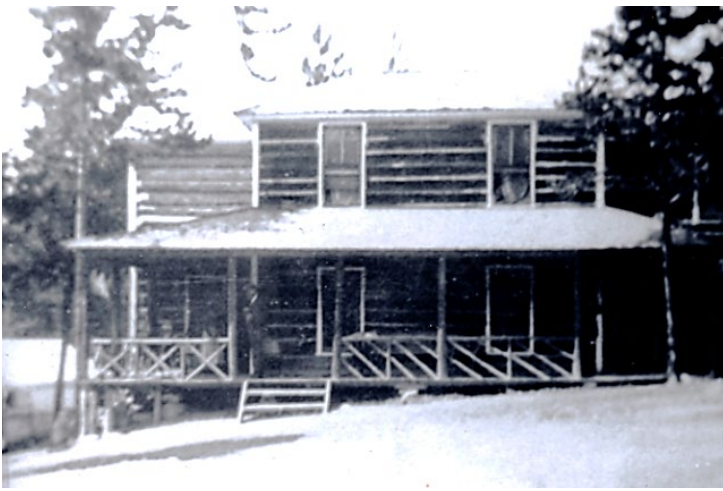

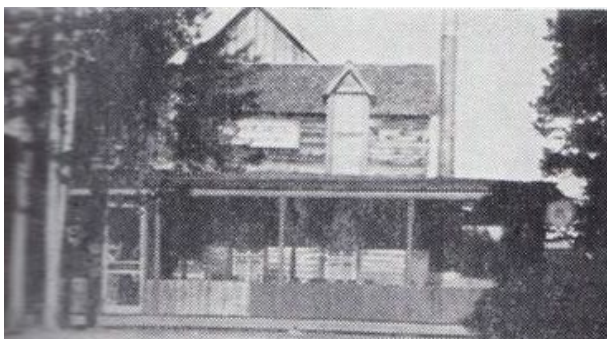

**Came to Grand Lake to teach school in several years ago. After I got married my husband and I have the Kauffman House hotel. We have three girls. My husband died last year.**

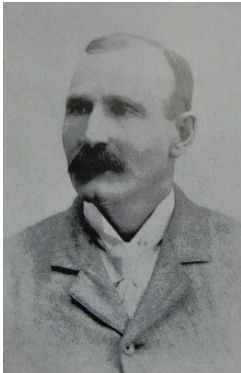

The building is a large one-story log, Rustic Style meeting hall located in the center of Grand Lake's historic Town Square. It is 36' x 70' in size. The exterior is rough-hewn lodgepole pine logs in a slab style construction. The logs had no exterior treatment. The sloped roof had green asphalt shingles. The foundation consisted of poured concrete with a 300 square foot basement and a three-foot crawl space. There are nine windows on the building's south side (front) façade that are trimmed in plain milled boards. The off-center door also has plain wood surrounds.



## **Community events of the 1920s were recorded in the Middle Park Times.**

August 12, 1921 Purchased new piano and a Grafonola for use in the Community House. Dances are being given regularly on Wednesday and Saturday evenings and the proceeds from these dances are used to make payments on the musical instruments. There is a splendid orchestra and all of our county people who like to dance are urged to attend.

September 9, 1921 A chimney is being built in the Community House so that the building may be heated. Planning to give the Pioneers a warm welcome.

Association is planning for a municipal camping ground to be ready for use at the beginning of the tourist season next year.

September 23, 1921 The meeting of the Grand County Pioneers held at Grand Lake last Saturday and was an enjoyable affair as had been anticipated. Many of the people arrived at the Lake early in the afternoon and enjoyed themselves by boating and sight-seeing around the Lake. Between 60 and 75 Pioneers and as many relatives and friends were seated at the Banquet served at the Rustic Inn by Mrs. Josephine Langley. After the dinner, the Rev. Hodges of Grand Lake made an appropriate address and delivered a eulogy on the members of the organization who had passed on during the past year. Captain McCarty and his daughter Louise placed his boats at the disposal of the Pioneers free, except for the ride around the lake in the moonlight on the Mickey after the banquet. He charged the nominal sum of 50 cents per person.

Mary Lyons Cairns wrote an article for The Farmer's Wife which was published in June 1922. Her great-granddaughter Heather will read parts of that article.

## THE NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE



**Because the snows of the long winter shut us away from the rest of the world, we have felt the urge for a community gathering place.**

**Raising funds is always of fundamental importance. We thought it was most feasible to procure the money for building by public subscription. The amounts to be pledged either in money, labor or material. No one was asked or urged to give more than he could afford.**

**The total cost of the building was \$5,589.73. There were 95 personal subscriptions from \$5 to \$200. Because so many were permitted to give, the interest in the idea was widespread and a feeling of community pride and ownership was created.**

**The uses to which our House has been put are many. Several times the house has been open for the solemn services of a funeral. The first one for Jim, young, happy, care free Jim, who had worked on the building. Day after day he had labored with his saw and hammer, little knowing he was working on a monument to himself.**

**No community should be without a gathering place of this kind. With it, the people are better in thought and deed, richer in the comfort and blessings of unified service. One for all and all for one.**

1923 Community House in the public square is the center for the new tri-weekly dances under the management of Mrs. John Zick. Orchestra composed of Carl Collman, drummer, Arthur Gow, pianist, and Rufus Carter, banjoist will play at the Community house on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturdays and at Grand Lake Lodge and Pine Cone Inn – a total of six dances per week in Grand Lake.

1924 Winter Sports Frolic – school was dismissed and amateur skiers resounded from shore to shore along the lake. Everybody donned skis and had the time of their lives on the ski course near the village. Exhibition skiing by national jumpers was interesting and thrilling. That evening the ladies of the community finished off the activities of the day with a fine dinner at the Community House with 45 hungry mouths there to partake of the good things to eat. Following the dinner all enjoyed a social evening until late that night.

1924 Loren Eslick and George Hughes were hosts at a community dance at the community house last Saturday night. Some of the special features of the evening were the Grand March and the Virginia Reel. General dancing was enjoyed until a late hour. Doughnuts, cocoa and coffee were served. Music was furnished by the local orchestra.

1924 150 old settlers of Grand County in Grand Lake Sept 20 for reunion and banquet. Banquet was held at Rustic Inn, served by Mrs. Josephine Langley. Program was given at the community house followed by dancing until 2 o'clock a.m. Mrs. Harry Rhone served midnight supper to the merry congregation. Program included readings, dance, pianologue, Minuet dance in Colonial Costume, Solo and Grand March and dancing to the Old Settlers orchestra with "old time" music.

September 1925 Dr. Davis (minister) called a group of Grand Lake people together in the Community House to talk about organizing a Community Church. The idea is to use the Community House for the church, and to have all denominations in it, letting preachers of different churches who happen to be spending vacations here take charge of services each Sunday. Dr Davis suggested a yearly Sunday basket dinner to draw everyone together and create a religious friendliness among the natives and cottagers. Girls from the Grand Lake Lodge formed a choir. The same service was held at the Grand Lake Lodge that night, but more informal. A vesper service with 150 in attendance.

1927 May 26 Grand Lake school pupils presented the play "Diamonds and Hearts" at the Community House. A dance followed the play.

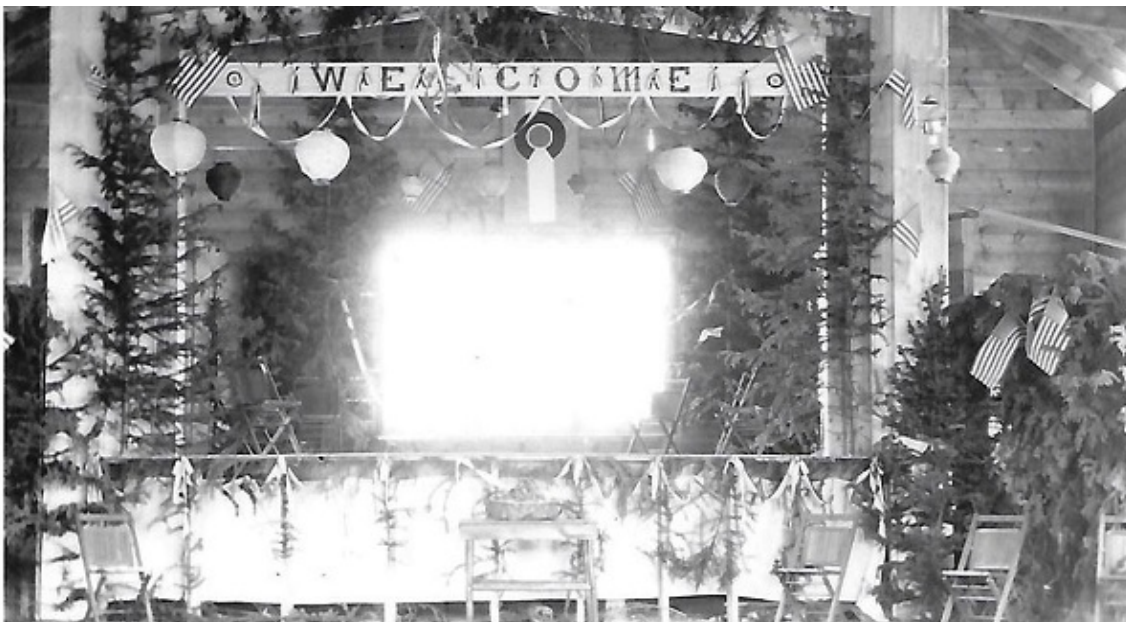
Two students were presented diplomas on May 27. The program included was the wedding of Tom Thumb in which Nellie Joe Young acted as bride, Bobbie Ish as groom, Ervin Spitzmiller as the preacher, Raymond Young as ring bearer, Patty Ish as flower girl, Jack Ish and Virginia Masterson as grandfather and grandmother and the following as attendants, Barbara & Gordon Spitzmiller, Evelyn & Jiggs Carr and Hazel Masterson. Mrs. Leslie Ish sang "Dawning" and Mrs. Spitzmiller and Mrs Ish sang a duet "Whispering Hope".

Orchestra numbers were furnished by the Grand Lake orchestra, composed of Mrs. Goldie Hawkins, pianist, Andy Ehrhart, cellist, Cary Howard and Leslie Ish, violinists, Ira Myers on the saxophone and Ed Howard on the guitar. Two dances by the older pupils of the school furnished color and variety to the program, and a red, white and blue drill. A dance followed the program.

The history of the Grand Lake Women's Club, which was begun in 1912, gives evidence of their involvement with the Community House. From the beginning the women were involved with promoting and encouraging the development and improvement of the town. Carrie Schnoor, Carolyn Rhone, Mary Lyons Cairns and Belle Kauffman were all teachers who came to town and were active in everything. You have met several of them tonight.



The Woman's Club sponsored dances, bought tables – card tables and tables to serve food - and dishes for the Community House.



They cleaned and decorated, giving poinsettias for the house at Christmas and putting up a decorated Christmas tree every year. They planned card parties, potluck suppers and movie nights

The club purchased playground equipment for the children to have in the yard. By 1933 they eventually paid to have the building cleaned. At Christmas time members made sacks of candy to be handed out at the yearly visit from Santa at the community house. In 1934 they supported building a basement for a community room to hold a kitchen and club and Sunday school rooms.



1932 May 22 was clean-up day. The Grand Lake Woman's Club ladies had dinner for the workers at the Community house.

In the summer of 1935, there was an advertisement in the Middle Park Times announcing the opening of the Grand Lake (Movie) Theatre. The first movie was "Bright Eyes" featuring Shirley Temple. With comedies, cartoons, and short subjects. Admission 40 cents and 20 cents beginning at 7:45 p.m.

A full listing of the movies was printed in the June 27, 1935 paper. There were no business listings in the Colorado Business Directory so the assumption is that they were presented at the Community House.

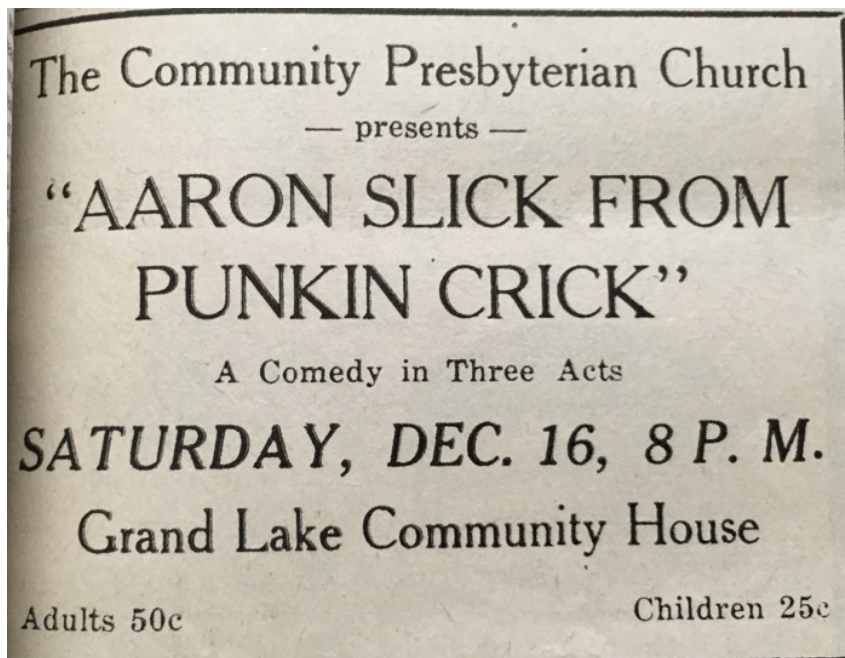
1938 Funeral services were held at the Grand Lake Community house for Nelson House, pioneer resident of Grand Lake, age 88.

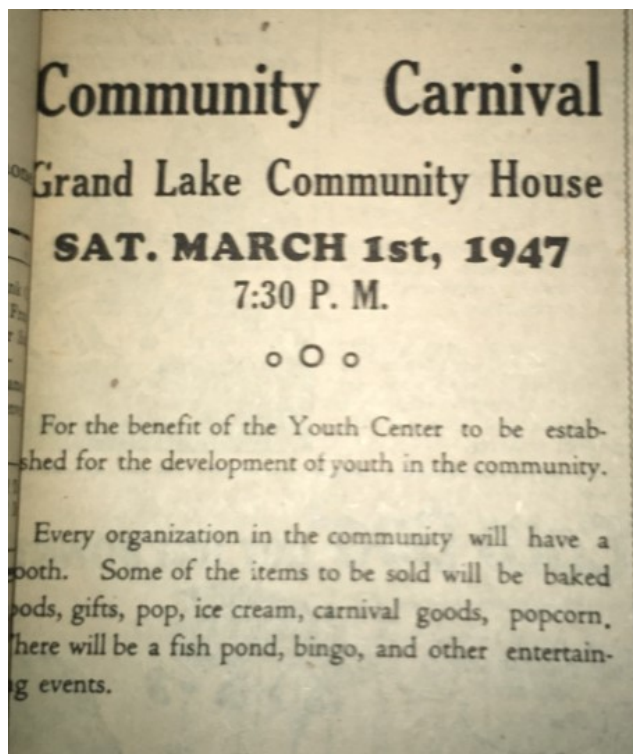

A proposal to build shuffleboard courts for the city park, but at \$300 or more each they were not completed. Woman's Club purchased horseshoes and pegs in 1954 which were eventually installed in the park. Playground equipment was repaired and new equipment purchased in 1959. The club purchased trash containers for the park.





The first advertisement of the Lake Theater was found in a 1940 issue of the Grand Lake Pioneer newspaper. From additional advertising about the movie theater in Grand Lake we know that in the summer movies were offered every night with two shows at 7 and 9 pm. During the winter the shows in Grand Lake were held on Tuesday and Friday nights.

Martha Howard Boehner – “My earliest memory of a movie is from 1948 when I was 6 years old and there was the opportunity to see The Wizard of Oz. We sat on wooden folding chairs. I remember the scene in the movie of the witch riding her bike and taking Toto away riding in the basket on the back of her bicycle. It scared the daylights out of me.

Nancy Lavington – “I remember going to the movies in the 40s. Originally the seats were folding chairs and eventually someone donated theater seats that came from a theater in Denver. They were fancy velvety, maroon-colored ones. In the 50s, I worked at Humphries and they would keep the soda fountain open until after the 2<sup>nd</sup> show so theater goers could come in for a treat.”

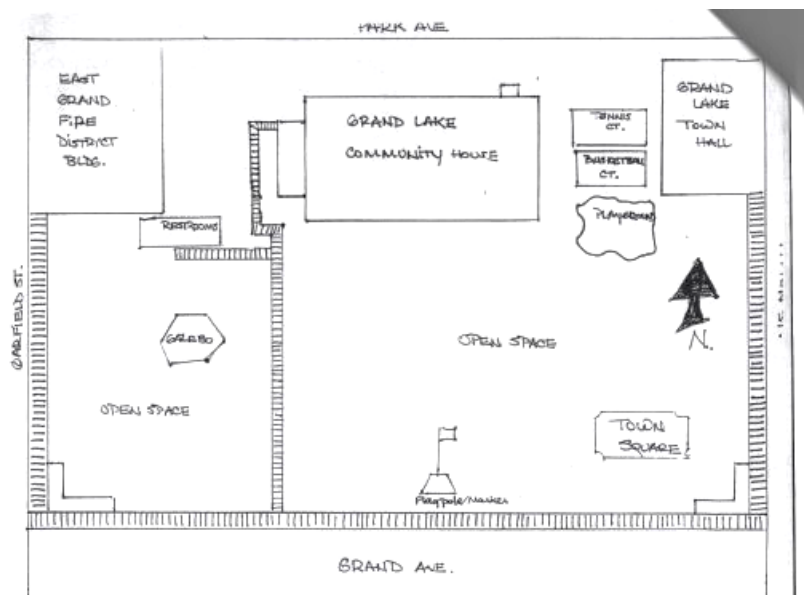

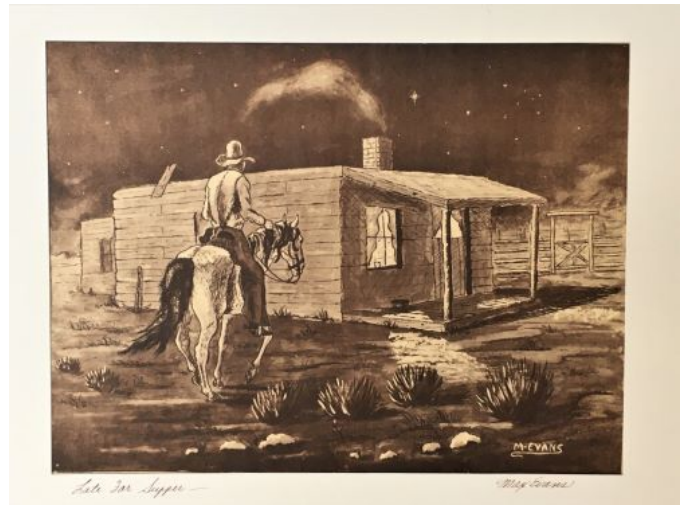
“The Woman’s Club made draperies for the Community house in the 1950s. They sent for bedspread samples which were finally ordered. Directions were distributed at a meeting. Discussion was held at several meetings on how to get the curtains hung. Eventually a day came when the old chairs in the Community House were removed and the curtains were to be hung before the new seats were put in. Hanging was left to the men. The cost came to \$106.89. Women’s club continued making curtains for the Chamber building and the Recreation center (Thompson building) in Grand Lake.

To go along with the drapes cowboy theme, a series of pictures drawn by Max Evans were displayed along the walls of the theater. Guy Allmeyer loaned these pictures to the Historical Society for display at our annual meeting. Max Evans was from Taos, NM and did his drawings in the early 1950s.





Florence and Paul Allmeyer purchased the theatre business from Red Ervin in 1953. Paul, Guy and Susan were their three children. Guy was 1 year old in 1953. They operated the theater only in the summer from May through September. I called his sister Susan Shields in Tucson, Arizona. Guy thought she might know how his mother got her nickname "Cokie". She said that her mother loved Coca Cola and her husband called her Cokie and it stuck.



Carolyn Rhone donated a piano to the theater. Cokie Allmeyer began inviting Lutheran ministers to conduct church services at the Community House when they came to Grand Lake for a summer vacation. Paul Allmeyer built a lectern for the services.

Cokie Allmeyer is seen at the back of the theater. Florence took a job in Denver in 1970 and the brothers, Paul and Guy, (18 & 22) ran the movie theater from 1970 – 1975.





When Martha Howard was in upper elementary school and high school the theater was run by the Allmeyer family. "Cokie was a special friend to sooo many of the teenagers of the community. "



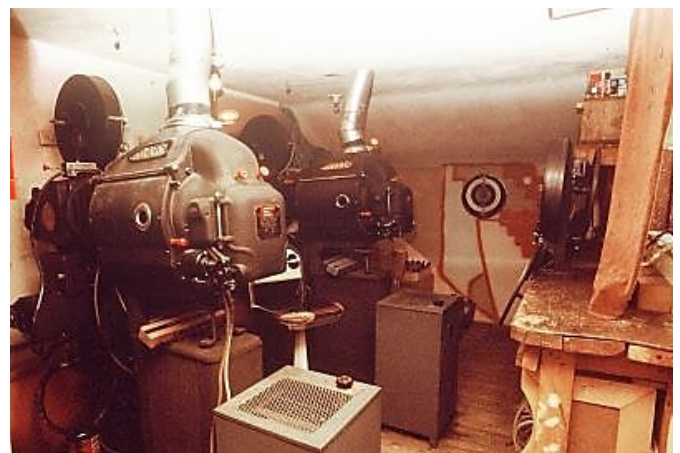
"At some point during my high school years I was hired to run the theater's concession stand which was set up in the entryway. Popped lots of popcorn in that big machine and sold the homemade caramel and cinnamon apples that were made in a local candy shop. Carole Moore was often the projectionist during those years and the movies were usually shown 2 or 3 times a night in the summer. The last movie was over around midnight and we'd help clean up the theater."

"I remember going to every Roy Rogers movie that came along and Gene Autry too. Later ones that stick in my mind were the horror films popular at that time, such as Them (about giant ants), The Thing and The Blob. I also remember The Day the Earth Stood Still from the early 50s and in the 70s we went to a Vietnam war film which was

too upsetting to watch."

The Lake Theater was definitely an important part of growing up in the 40s, 50s and 60s in Grand Lake.

Paul and Florence separated in the mid-50s and were divorced in 1967. After they separated Paul moved to Granby and ran the El Grande theater. The children then helped their mother at the theatre in Grand Lake. Susan said she misses Grand Lake and the theater. She was the candy girl. They sold popcorn for 10 cents. They had a big heavy stainless-steel popper. They didn't have a cash register and figured everything in their head. They had an arrangement with Eleanor's Sweet Shop to sell fudge and divinity, Caramel apples (20 cents) and cinnamon apples for 15 cents. Bud Spitzmiller ran the projectors. Guy, at age 16 worked cleaning the Spitzmiller cabins. Friends were Tim Randall, Don Yaeger family at Devil's Thumb, Lewis family from Granby Drug Store



More memories: Wine only came in half gallon containers though, and so those were hard to get past Cokie but crowd enough people in at one time, you could get a half gallon by. But she'd normally catch us on one thing or another.

Jeanette: There was a theater so we would get to come to Grand Lake. 50 cents to get into a movie, and the lady that owned it was Cokie Allmeyer. And there were some kids, didn't have much money, they worked at the sawmill up by the park. She would let them in if they didn't have the money. Anybody can just go in and watch movies, and that was in the community house.

Rich: Jeanette and I went to the show all the time. It was that or not much of anything else. A lot of the time I'd give her money to get into the theater; when I got change back, it'd be the same amount of money I gave her. It would be in, you know, like \$1 or three or \$4. Yeah, that happened more than once. She was a good community person.

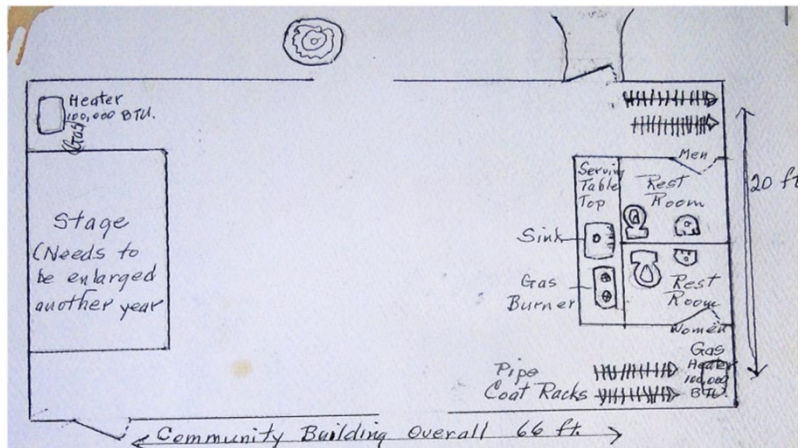
Bob Scott remembers that the film canisters came on the Greyhound bus that stopped at the Grand Lake Lodge. He had to call the theater owners to pick them up and then they were returned for a trip back to Denver.

On Facebook there are memories of people about the Lake Theater – You Know you are from Grand County when.....





In the 1960s the Woman's club worked to modernize the Community Building. They funded a project to install two rest rooms and worked to get others to do the work. They spent three years trying to get someone to put windows in the restrooms and donated a mirror. They installed two gas heaters, sink and gas plate and iron pipe coat racks. The town council matched funds up to \$500. Hot water heaters were purchased, a 30-cup coffee pot was purchased with 4000 Gold Bond Stamps for the Community Building and later was moved to Trinity in the Pines church.



In 1964 the town wanted to partition off the community building to separate office space and Woman's Club was to decide what goes to the dump. Club members varnished the exterior of the community building in 1965.

GL Women's Club purchased a playground set for smaller children and placed in the public park. They repainted trash barrels in the park and Thanks was painted on the sides instead of Trash. The club

also built and paid for the installation of a tennis court in 1964-65. Cost estimate was \$1800. It was understood it would be flooded for ice skating. Paving was \$750 from a contractor who was resurfacing roads in the area. A member donated a net and the next year the club put up a chain link fence.







In 1966-67 the club made a garden in front of the Community Building with a statue in memory of Joe Astog, a local angler. In 67-68 they donated two picnic tables for the park. Painting by Elsie Patty of the statue and garden.

In the 1970s the club purchased a new net for the tennis court.

Arlen Gupton purchased the Lake Theater from Cokie Allmeyer in 1976. He was a school teacher and wanted to have something to keep his five children busy during the summers. Pam shared her memories of working at the theater when she was in junior and senior high school. Her father operated the theater until 1988. They had two shows every night and matinees in the summer. In the winter they had shows on weekends. They operated a popcorn stand and sold a sack of popcorn for \$1 or a bucket for \$3. Pam still has that popcorn popper.

There were cue marks on the film – the film came in two reels and they had to watch when to switch to the second reel. They had a lot of fun – they would make shadow pictures on the screen and they could stand behind the screen and still see the audience. She remembers someone on the screen smoking a cigarette and she went up to catch the ash when it fell. One night there was the shadow of a bat on the screen and they thought it was part of the movie but instead it was inside the theater. When the show was over, they had to clean the theater and sweep everything to the front.

Pam remembers they had to change the marquee with the names of the movie. There were large metal letters and they had to climb a big ladder. One time when she was on the ladder a motorcycle gang kept circling around the marquee. It was the fastest she ever got that job



done.

**Middle Park Times August 1985: Winter movies set for Grand Lake Theater**

A new four-year lease was negotiated between the town board and Arlen Gupton for continued use of the Community building as a movie theatre. As its portion of the agreement, the town was to winterize the building.

The lease called for an annual payment of \$9,000 compared to the previous

\$4,400 rental, with an escalation clause. In addition to a minimum 100-day lease for summer movies, the pact also called for 50 days of winter operation during 1985, 45 days in 1986 and 50 days in each of 1987 and 1988. The board agreed to winterize the building, hoping that in addition to winter motion pictures the building would be used for unspecified community events. We have listened to the public's desire for a theatre and have negotiated a more than fair lease. The Gupton's lease expired in 1989. No more movies.





In 1989 a number of improvements were made to the Community House, due primarily to energy and code requirements. These included the vestibule addition to the west entrance, a new heating and ventilation system, installation of insulated thermal pane windows, new interior theater lighting, and a wood plank handicapped entrance ramp. The interior remains unchanged with the original hardwood maple flooring, plaster walls and wood accent trim. The east end of the building has a stage and elevated backstage area which was part of the original building construction. The dimensions of the meeting room are approximately 36 x 40 with a ceiling height of 20 feet. Theater lighting has been added to enhance the annual stage productions.

The vestibule, which was added to provide a small entry lobby, handicapped entrance, and energy savings, also houses the theater lighting booth. It is constructed of frame with lapped wood siding stained to match the log exterior of the rest of the building.

Other modifications include removable lattice inserts for the windows which are used to provide shade during theater productions. The two chimneys and decorative spotlights. The fire siren on the roof has not been used for five years and there are plans to remove it.

1989 – Women's Club had an ice cream and cake sale to raise \$334.92 Most of the money was used to buy five tables for the community building.

April 14, 1989 – Grand County Theatre Association invitation to preview the progress of Grand Lake Community House. Luncheon served at 1:00 pm. Gene Stover, Mayor in 1989, spoke to a group about renovations of the Community House and offered the building for live theater.

The Grand Lake Area Arts Council was formed in the fall of 1989 with the help from the Colorado Rural Arts Initiative fund. Olde Fashioned Christmas – Terry Sidell and Pat Jones started the first Craft Bazaar. The three objectives of the first year, 1990, were to team with Rocky Mountain National Park and the Town of Grand Lake to celebrate the parks 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary, to provide a summer music series called “Music on the Green” and third, to provide winter entertainment with a Christmas play of some kind.

The Community Theater production of The Plight Before Christmas concluded the Arts Council’s first year. Melodramas were presented for a week between Christmas and New Year’s every year until 2014.



The Arts Council sponsored six performances of the Grand Lake Women's Club original Grand Lake Historical pageant from 1936 in 1990 for the park's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary at the town and at the Timber Creek Campground amphitheater and the American Heritage Music Program. Women's club donated for the town's new sound system.



A fountain was placed in town park in memory of Marty Schneller who worked hard for the Repertory Theatre. The fountain was later moved by the old town hall building.





The town applied for the Grand Lake Community House to be added to the Register of Historic Colorado Places, making it eligible for financial aid in its maintenance and preservation.

In August of 1993 the 70-year-old Grand Lake Community House was listed in the register of Colorado's Historic Places. Through its designation as an historic landmark, the building became eligible for numerous grants to aid in its preservation and maintenance. As a result of a \$130,000 energy impact grant, the town planned an addition to the hall to house the town offices and police department. In addition, running water and indoor restrooms were added to the hall and a kitchen installed.

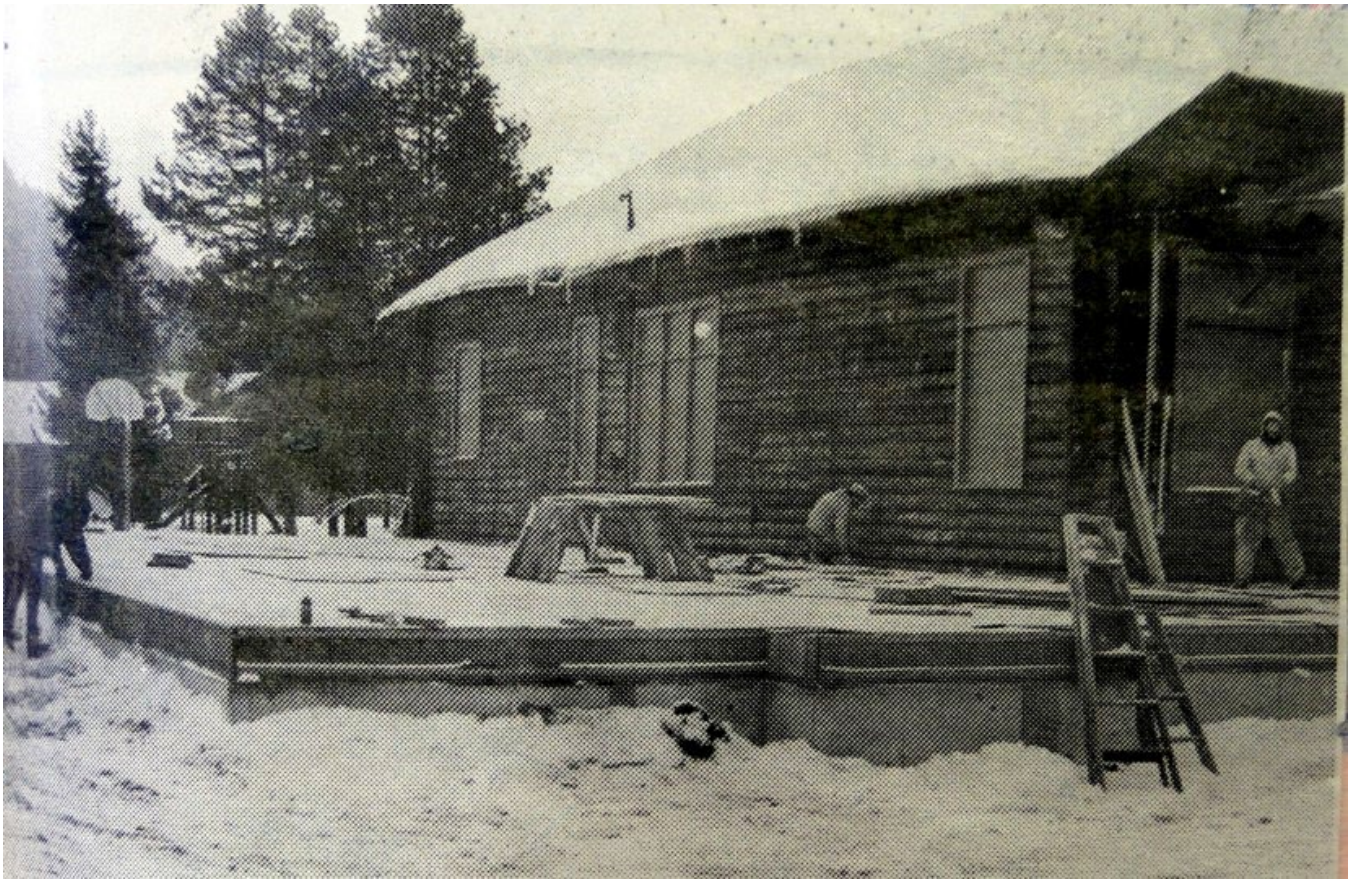
Patience Kemp and town manager Mark Collins appeared before the Colorado Historical Society Board seeking a \$40,000 grant to be used in repairs to the building. The board forwarded a "do pass" recommendation to the society's board of directors. If approved by the entire board, this money cannot be used to underwrite construction costs on the addition but can be used to improve the existing structure. Work is expected to begin very soon on replacing the roof, applying a preservative to the log walls and other major projects.

A new addition to town hall was built in 1993. The new foundation was poured which will house the town offices, police headquarters and indoor restrooms and the Juniper Library will move into the present town hall. Woman's Club pledged \$200 for kitchen furnishings. A refrigerator, gas stove and dishwasher were purchased from Gambles for \$1,199.85. \$50 was spent for silverware and plastic covers for the tables. The remodeled Community Center opened in 1994 and the Town officials moved into their new quarters in 1995.

In the spring of 1995, a sparkling new kitchen was added and has been given a real workout since opening in June. Senior citizens, youth groups and other community organizations have taken full advantage of the new improvement. In 1995 Woman's Club provided supper for fifty bicyclers staying overnight in the Community House. They served spaghetti.









In 1995 Live theater in Grand Lake was reborn and The Rocky Mountain Repertory Theater performed at the Grand Lake Community House. The theater moved into their brand-new theater in 2011.

As a result of the new improvements the Community House was delisted from the State Register of Historic Properties. The Grand County Historical Association sent a letter in August of 1996 to the State protesting the delisting.

**It is still listed.**

A permanent exhibit will be placed in the Community Center by the Grand Lake Area Historical Society. It will include a theater seat, framed drawing by Guy Allmeyer, the Cowboy drapery from the 1950s and a selection of posters. These items have all been donated by Guy Allmeyer to the Historical Society and Town of Grand Lake.

We are still preparing the signage to go with the items in the lobby of the Community House.

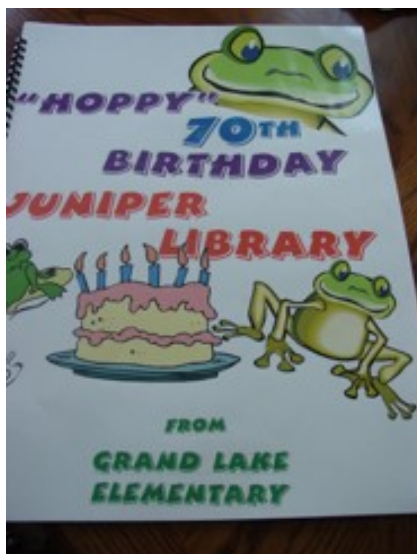
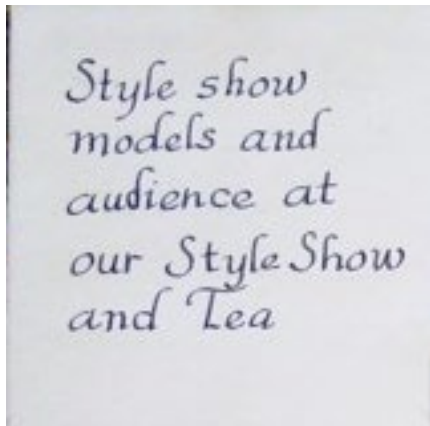


2007 – Board room at Town Hall renovated
