# THREE FAMILIES SHARE HISTORY

## On the Shore of Grand Lake

It's interesting how some early property-owning families in Grand Lake are connected. For years I wondered how my grandparents managed to find their way to Grand Lake in 1908. I suspected it had to do with the Craig Adams family, who owned the large two-story summer log cabin at the southeast corner of the lake. I believed this because I had the 1908 deed of sale for 100 feet of lake shore property for \$300.00 from Jay E. Adams (1862-1923) to my grandparents, Earl and Anna Batty and Riley and Nora Keester, but exactly how the Craig Adams family and my family became connected was still a mystery.

Earl Batty (1879-1920) was a dentist and Mr. Keester (1863-1944) an attorney/business man. The Battys did not own a car but the small farming community of Alma, where both couples lived, was a whistle stop on the C.B. & Q. RR located half way between Omaha and Denver. When I was a boy, I remember my father telling me that each summer, around the first of August, Anna and her two sons boarded the Number 5 train, arrived in Denver mid-morning, then boarded the Denver & Salt Lake to Granby, and finally either went by touring car or bus to Grand Lake. "Captain" McCarty would take them across the lake in one of his large wooden boats. The two families would stay until after Labor Day, then leave before school started.

About twenty years ago I became interested in Grand Lake history and my own family genealogy. One day, I discovered both sides of my grandparents' families and also brothers Lee and Jay Adams in the 1885 Alma, Nebraska census, so Alma must have been the connection between the families. It turns out, *four* families from Alma eventually purchased property on the south shore of Grand Lake.

According to the deed, the original Adams cabin was about 300 feet east of the Batty/Keester property. That cabin was at the east end of Jericho Road on a large rock and consisted of a main room with fire place and a smaller bedroom on the west side. From what I have been able to learn, Jay had the cabin built around 1889, probably making it one of the first permanent summer cabins on the lake.



In the early 1890s, Jay Adams moved his family to San Antonio, TX because it was thought to be a better climate to keep from contracting tuberculosis. In 1900, Jay Adams sold the cabin to a Mrs. Cook and moved to a newer, larger one near the southeast corner of the lake. Unlike Jay's cabin on the rock with a sharp drop off into the cold lake, the new area had a sand beach and shallow water. In 1910 Jay built a third summer cottage just south of

the second one, and that is the one I grew up knowing back in the 50s and 60s.

John Kirkpatrick (1864-1953), also from San Antonio, was in the real estate business with Jay Adams who sold Kirkpatrick lots on Grand Lake. John then built, around 1912, what is known today as the Hallmark House. Joyce Hall rented the Kirkpatrick cottage starting in 1922 and purchased it in 1929. It has remained in the Hall family except for a few years in the '60s when it was gifted to Denver University.



Adams and Kirkpatrick built a fresh water system for their properties. Adams tapped into a stream of water above his house, used a large wooden barrel to collect the water, and then piped it down to the two houses. The Hall water tank still exists to the southeast of their original servants' quarters.
