The Cottage Court Museum, located at 729 Lake Avenue, at the corner of Vine Street and Lake, will also be open daily 11:00 – 5:00 beginning May 27^h. Come by to enjoy the stories of ingenious entrepreneurs, surprising inventions, goofy

mistakes, seemingly endless struggles and hardwon success as cars first brought visitors to town and forever changed our lives and our economy. Be sure to get your picture taken in the '29 Ford!





The humble building next to the Court is the Eslick Store, built by a Smith Family grandson, Loren Eslick in 1933. Beginning in early July, 2023, it will begin a transformation to become a visitors' welcome center at the still-developing Cottage Court History Park. Lifted in place, and put on a

roundation, it will have its exterior restored, roof replaced and windows and doors made just as they were originally. Then, in Fall, we'll begin fixing the interior, adding a tour guides' station with all the necessary electronics, a gift shop and a public restroom. It's going to be a valuable asset to the site and the west side of our community, and it's exciting. Stop by to watch the work and learn what's next for the Eslick Store!

As you may have noticed, we've changed the name of the site where the Cottage Court Museum and Eslick Store are located. It was previously called the Smith-Eslick Cottage Camp. It will become more than that name suggests. It will become the Cottage Court History Park, with bench seating, a firepit, a small pavilion mimicking the cottage court roofline, a projection screen for presentations and much more. All on the grassy area behind the Cottage Court.

A seventeen-member Planning Committee is working hard to firm up these plans which we will then have in-hand to share with the community. It's going to be a perfect place for sharing fascinating history stories, fun events, music, and so much more. We invite you to learn about this project. JOE WESCOTT – a PIONEER'S LIFE

Joseph L. Wescott (1838-1912)

Grand Lake's first permanent white resident was a pioneer, miner, trapper, fisher, poet, storyteller, Civil War veteran, and even Grand Lake's first official postmaster in 1877. He originally came to Colorado in pursuit of a fortune in gold and silver but when the Civil War broke out, he became a private in the 15th Regiment, Colorado Cavalry (formed Dec. 1861) and fought the Texas Confederates at Glorieta Pass in 1862.

When he mustered out in 1865, his inflammatory arthritis was so bad that he sought the



warm springs at Hot Sulphur to heal, traveling most of the way in a hammock slung between burros. However, due to a few bad business deals, he eventually settled in Grand Lake in 1867. Under the Homestead Act of 1862,

which allowed a person to improve a property within five years of attaining

it and to become the owner of up to 160 acres, Wescott was able to build a second cabin not long after he arrived. In the early 1880s Joe homesteaded 154 acres at the west end of the lake.



Wescott was born in Nova Scotia, Canada to John (abt. 1797-1865) and Hannah (1802 - 1891) Wescott. He had two sisters and 3 brothers; the youngest sibling having been born in the US. The family first migrated to Grand Rapids,

Michigan, but ended up in Marshalltown, Iowa by 1860. In all the census listings Wescott gave his occupation as miner. However, this term was used as a catch-all, and he probably earned his money by fishing and



trapping, sending his catch over the mountains to sell in Georgetown and elsewhere. He would keep the fish in live boxes at the west end of Grand Lake where he lived alone in a two-room basic log cabin with dirt floors and

few amenities. One source says he was a good cook and guests especially like his baked potatoes, sour dough bread and cake. As a bachelor, Wescott wasn't exactly a hermit, but not sociable on his own terms. He knew and shared great stories and legends. One, which he heard from the Ute Indians, he turned into a long poem titled the Legend of Grand Lake. As the years went by, he sold off his land for home lots. In fact, today's Point Park was part of Wescott's homestead.

He returned to Iowa and the home of a niece when his health deteriorated and died in 1912. His cause of death was listed as 'Locomotor Ataxia,' a severe progressive disease of the central nervous system. The funeral director was the D. C. Wilbur Store, which was probably primarily a general or hardware store because funerals were a common side business in small rural towns in the 1800s and early 1900s.
